

STUDY OVERVIEW

RESEARCH PURPOSE

Assist designers and specifiers in understanding the most popular styles and features throughout North America and provide an indicator of what's trending for the next three years.

RESEARCH OBJECTIVES

The specific objectives of the project are:

- Identify categories and new products that have the most dramatic impact on today's kitchens and bathrooms.;
- Determine styles, features, and materials that professional designers and specifiers think will be most popular over the next three years.

METHODOLOGY/ SAMPLE

583 completed online surveys with NKBA database and lists conducted October 12-31, 2018

Respondent qualifications:

- Identify as one of the following: Designer, Builder/Remodeler, Cabinet Shop, Dealer, Decorative Plumbing/Hardware, Distributor, Manufacturer/Supplier, Manufacturer Rep, Architect;
- Have designed, specified, or sold products for at least 1 kitchen or bathroom project in 2018.






- The most interesting new products for bathrooms include offerings in showers or shower surrounds, vanities/cabinetry and technology solutions.




